

Our History

Celebrating over 60 Years of Arts in Education

Young Audiences of Virginia first brought arts-in-education programs to Virginia in 1955. From its humble beginnings, with a single string ensemble and a handful of volunteers, the organization has grown to nearly 200 professional artists in various artistic disciplines. In our first decade, we worked in the Hampton Roads area with the Feldman String Quartet and visited 20 schools. In the 1960s the "Norfolk" Chapter of Young Audiences was independently incorporated and our programming increased to 90 hours per year.

During our third decade, the 1970s, we hired our first professional staff and our programs doubled. YAV changed its name to reflect our entire service area, becoming the Virginia Chapter of Young Audiences, Inc.

In the 1980s, our programs expanded extensively into Central, Southwestern, and Northern Virginia, as well as North Carolina and West Virginia. During this productive decade, our board of directors elected to change its name to Young Audiences of Virginia, Inc.

By the 1990s, the organization had expanded significantly, providing more than 900 hours of programming in schools throughout the state. As part of a national network, Young Audiences received the National Medal of Arts, which was presented by President Bill Clinton to one of our national board members, Yo Yo Ma, at the White House. During this critical decade of our history, we began to integrate our programming fully into the Virginia Standards of Learning (SOLs) mandated by the State Department of Education.

Now in our 60th year, we are the largest arts-in-education organization in Virginia. We provided over 1,600 program hours last year and reached more than 64,500 students, parents, artists and educators. A significant amount of our service hours now include in-depth, in-school and after-school artist in residence programs, impacting the creative development of students in a profound way. We are also expanding our commitment to systemic change by providing quality arts integration teacher training in partnership with school systems and universities.

Top 10 Things To Know About YAV



- 1. YAV offers arts-in-education programming in all art forms to schools, museums, libraries and any facility invested in education through the arts.
- 2. YAV Artists offer in and after school performances, workshops, and residency projects to enhance core curriculum concepts.

Meet the Executive Director

Michael Kerry Williams began his musical and artistic interests at a young age as a soloist with the American Boychoir, a Broadway Artist and a Television Actor. This experience forged his love for music, arts, and his hope for all children to experience quality artistry and expression. Mr. Williams is a former educator in New York, New Jersey and North Carolina.

Mr. Williams served Young Audiences of Virginia as the Artistic Director since 2000. In 2013 he took on



the Executive Director position and implemented new arts-integrated initiatives including Kindergarten Readiness, Teen Resilience, Summer Arts Camp Programming and enhanced Out of School Time offerings. Michael developed a strong multicultural program, providing diversity awareness and cultural understanding for young people as well as a compare and contrast educational philosophy exploring communications, similarities and common ground through the arts.

He has received arts integrated training from National Young Audiences, Inc., Kennedy Center for the Arts, and Wolf Trap. Mr. Williams holds a Bachelor of Music in Performance and a Bachelors of Music in Composition from Westminster Choir College-Princeton, as well as MM from NYU with studies at Juilliard School of Music and Boston Conservatory.

While leading Young Audiences of Virginia's staff and artists, Michael maintains his career as a classical musician and composer. His compositions and arrangements cross boundaries from children's musicals, choral works, classical art songs, instrumental and songwriting. As a vocalist, past performances include appearances with the Metropolitan Opera, New York City Opera, Virginia Opera, Atlanta Opera, Augusta Opera, Charleston opera, Carolina Opera, Spoleto Festival, Glimmerglass, Bucks County Players, Encore Theatre, Westminster Choir, and the New York Choral Society to name a few. He has performed under the baton of Leonard Bernstein, Zubin Mehta, Ricardo Mutti, Hugh Wolf, John Williams, among others.

Mr. Williams is the current Chair of the Chesapeake Fine Arts Commission, is active with the Virginia Symphony Education Committee, Virginia Opera and with several regional arts organizations. He holds memberships with The Greater Hampton Roads Cultural Alliance, VMEA, American Choral Directors Association, ASCAP, and AEP.

A GRACEFUL EDUCATION: HOW DANCING HELPS PREPARE STUDENTS FOR VA STANDARDS OF LEARNING

Teaching Virginia's Standards of Learning through dance is not only possible, but there is recorded data from right here in Hampton Roads showing that connecting the arts to core curriculum can make a real impact on test scores.

Young Audiences – Arts for Learning – Virginia and Todd Rosenlieb Dance recently taught fifth and sixth grade girls and boys of Portsmouth Public Schools the math SOLs through tap and hip-hop dance. The results?

Based on a review of our pre-assessment and post-assessments of students from Simonsdale Elementary School who participated in the 8-week residency, 13% of students felt more positive about dance; 6% of students felt more positive about math; with, most importantly, an average increase of 40% in post-assessment scores. Of those students that felt more positive about math, 10% increased their opinion by 75%. And we aren't done yet. Churchland Primary and Intermediate School will begin the residency in January 2015.

ODU AND YOUNG AUDIENCES COLLABORATE FOR LEARNING LITERACY

Old Dominion University and Young Audiences of Virginia will host the Arts for Learning Conference on the ODU campus of Feb. 20-23. The conference brings arts educators and chapter representatives of the national Young Audiences network together in support of a national education initiative called Arts for Learning.

Young Audiences of Virginia is partnering with ODU's Darden College of Education to offer Arts for Learning Literacy Lessons as a continuing education course, making the university one of the first schools in the state to address new arts integration standards for teacher education.

"The Darden College of Education is pleased to collaborate with Young Audiences of Virginia in hosting the national conference to help educators integrate the arts into the traditional curriculum and to learn new ways of increasing student achievement in the core curriculum through the arts," said Dean Bill Graves. "I am pleased that faculty from the Darden College of Education and the College of Arts and Letters are participating in this interdisciplinary-based approach to teaching children and youth."

The Arts for Learning Literacy Lessons represent an exciting new direction in literacy education. Leveraging proven arts integration techniques in support of specific and measurable literacy goals, this five-unit series is designed to enhance literacy instruction for students in grades three through six. Created through a national initiative by Young Audiences for use by classroom teachers with no special training in the arts, each unit focuses on building students' understanding of specific literacy objectives.

Units cover plot, character, author's choice, character perspective and more. Through the use of theater techniques, graphic novel illustration, collage, music and dance, children create finished works to share with younger students. Weaving the arts into language arts instruction helps ignite the creative process for students.

A study of students from Brunswick, N.J., Cleveland and Houston, conducted by the independent education research firm WestEd, showed that students who received the Literacy Lessons made substantial gains on tests of literacy skills and understanding. After 18 hours of instruction the A4L students had:

- · two times as many story comprehension gains;
- · four times as many gains on questions related to understanding "author's choice" and vocabulary;
- · six times as many visualization gains; and
- · more than five times the gains in understanding story elements such as the central problem.

Children's literacy continues to be is a growing issue within the state:

- According to the Phonological Awareness Literacy Screening (PALS) last fall in Virginia, 12.5 percent of children arrived to kindergarten without the basic literacy skills needed to succeed in school
- 57 percent of Virginia's incoming fourth graders scored below proficient reading levels
- In Virginia, children who repeat grades kindergarten through third grade cost taxpayers about \$80m/year

Executive Director of Young Audiences of Virginia, Michael Kerry Williams said, "I am very proud to be a part of Arts Are Wild! We take pride in making literacy more entertaining for students and teaching families the importance of arts-for-learning."
